Luiten Can Upstage Rahm And Garcia - By Ian Hudson

Dustin Johnson won the World Golf Championship HSBC Champions in 2013 and he can win the tournament again at Sheshan International Golf Club in Shanghai. The world number one has a game suited to the host course and can become the first multiple winner of the event which was first played in its current format 2009. It has been played at Sheshan in every year since then except 2012 so there is plenty of course form to assess.

Johnson is the main tip of the week with Golf Rater. This is WIN's dedicated golf service that has produced a decent return on investment since proofing began at the start of the year. Subscribers have enjoyed a run of winners including Jordan Spieth at 16/1 in the Open Championship. This WGC event brings together the best players from all the global tours and it is the first elite event since the USPGA Championship in August. There is a limited field of 78 players so no cut which means everybody receives a cheque. The prize fund is almost \$10 million and points won count towards the FedEx Cup. It is the third leg of the Far East Swing on the US PGA Tour and the first two legs have been won by Pat Perez and Justin Thomas but the latter is absent.

Sheshan International is a par 72 course measuring 7,261 yards which is about average in length by modern standards. The course puts a premium on accuracy over distance and it features fairway bunkers and water hazards. The fairways are tree-lined and they lead to undulating greens. The key skills for good scoring are driving accuracy, greens in regulation and average putts per round. The course is a good test of a player's all round game and a quality player is usually the champion.

The average winning score over the seven renewals on the track is 19 under in a range from 11 to 23 below par. There has been one playoff and winning margins from one to seven shots. Three players from the United States have won, there have been four champions from Europe and Hideki Matsuyama from Japan is the defending champion. The field is made up mainly of tournament winners over the last year.

The HSBC Champions is the first event of the US PGA Tour season that attracts a strong field. Johnson is playing for the first time and in addition to win the event in 2013 he was tied fifth two years later. He had a poor playoffs at the end of last season but then won 4 points from 5 matches in the Presidents Cup. Johnson is currently the best player in the world and he can confirm that status by winning this week.

Johnson combines long and accurate driving which is a rare combination. He can avoid the hazards on the fairways and find plenty of greens with relatively short approach shots. His putting is good enough to make him the most likely winner this week and consolidate his position at the top of the world rankings. Johnson can embark on his new season with a victory in Shanghai.

Hideki Matsuyama cannot be ignored as a potential champion. He won the tournament last year with a score of 23 under. He was tied 5th on his last outing two weeks ago and is in decent form. Tyrell Hatton is on a hot streak and has won in his last two starts. The US Open champion Brooks Koepka has only finished lower than 20th once in his last eight outings. However, Johnson has most in his favour so can record his second win at Sheshan.

Forget About Finding Winners! - By Eddie Lloyd

I was asked last week by a friend of a friend how I go about finding my winners? I got a surprised look when I told them that I didn't look for winners, in fact, that's the last thing you want to do if you want to make a profit from backing the horses!

This may sound like a completely bizarre concept and one that would be laughed at inside every bookie up and down the land but stop to think about it for a second. Is the bookie looking for the winner? Who are we trying to get money from when we win? The bookie doesn't really care who wins the race just as long as they have taken

enough money on each runner in the field to cover their book. So if I'm not looking for the winner what am I trying to do?

My aim every day when I place my bets is to beat the bookie by not finding the winner but by beating him on his price. To illustrate that this works and is the most efficient way of making money this is what a trader working at a bookie will look at:

Customer 1: This customer has backed 20 winners in the last 2 weeks and is several thousands of pounds up. The prices he has taken are roughly the same price as SP. Keep his account open he will inevitably hit a losing run.

Customer 2: This customer has had 8 winners in the last 2 weeks and is a couple of hundred pounds in profit. All of his 12 winners have beaten SP by a long way. Minimise his account or limit to SP bets only.

As you can see, customer 1 is able to continue betting as he hasn't beaten the SP whereas customer 2 is going to be shut down because although he hasn't won as much as customer 1 he's beaten the SP.

Customer 2 is much more of a concern than customer 1 because the bookie knows that he is likely to continue to make money by beating the SP than customer 1.

Have a look at your betting each day. If you are beating the SP then you will be in with a chance of actually turning a profit as you have maths on your side.

England Can Limit The Damage To Less Than 16 points

Even though Great Britain have won the Rugby League World Cup three times England have never won the trophy. Beating Australia in their own back yard may be beyond them but England can go all the way and appear in the final in Brisbane at the start of December. They open the tournament against Australia on Friday morning and should be backed with a start of 16 points on the handicap at [10/11 with Ladbrokes](#). Australia are the better side but not by that much.

With no football to speak off tonight you will have to stay up late for the banker sporting bet of the day. Miami are at Baltimore in the NFL and the match starts at 1.25 early on Friday morning. It's hardly the fixture to stop a nation or provide entertainment for poor sleepers but backing MIAMI +3 at [10/11 with William Hill](#) could compensate for the lack of shut eye. In fact the visitors could win the match but backing them with a start provides some insurance.

One of my few winners at the Cheltenham Festival this year was Fayonagh in the bumper. The horse gave the field a head start and came from last to first in the final two furlongs. She was in my notebook for all the novice hurdles next March but sadly Fayonagh had a fatal accident on the gallops and is now running around the racecourse in the sky. The horse could have been anything but we'll never know.

The show goes on and racing is taking place today at one of my favourite tracks. Ludlow is the epitome of the minor meeting and the course is in a farming area and miles away from a big city. That does not detract from the racing even though its more bread and butter than quality. Since the start of the 2013/14 jumps season Dan Skelton has the best strike rate of trainers with runners today. When he sends horses to the Shropshire track one in four wins. He can enhance that record with HATCHER in the first (1.55pm) who must be backed at [5/4 with Betfred](#).

Australia Look Nailed On For Rugby League World Cup Glory - By Rick Elliott

The Rugby League World Cup is one of the major sporting tournaments of the year and fourteen teams are competing in Australia, New Zealand and Papua New Guinea from this Friday until the final in Brisbane on December 2nd. Australia cannot be opposed and look unbeatable at home.

The first match of the tournament is a group clash between Australia and England and the betting suggests that could also be the last match. Australia are big favourites to win the World Cup for the 11th time. England have never been the world champions in rugby league.

The first stage involves two groups of four teams and two groups of three teams who play each other on a round-robin basis. The top two teams in each group progress to the knockout rounds which culminate in the final. Matches are settled in 80 minutes or after extra-time if required.

There have been fourteen World Cups in rugby league in the past and only Australia, New Zealand and Great Britain have won the trophy. England were the losing finalists in 1975 and 1995 and reached the last four in 2000, 2008 and 2013 when the tournament was played in the UK, Ireland and France.

The tournament was expanded in 1995 and featured group stages and a knockout round. There have only been four events in this format of which Australia have won three. New Zealand won the World Cup in 2008 which was played in Australia. Only these two nations and France have appeared in every Rugby League World Cup but either Great Britain or England have always qualified.

In 2013 Australia beat New Zealand 34-2 in the final at Old Trafford. The match set a new record for the biggest attendance in the history of the tournament. New Zealand beat England in the semi-finals with a last minute try so England would have struggled to beat Australia if they had qualified for the final.

The Kangaroos are still the team to beat and it would be a major upset if they did not win the trophy. Cooper Cronk will have extra responsibility in the absence of Jonathan Thurston but is the world's best scrum-half. Most pundits predict the Aussies as the winners and it's hard to disagree with the bookmaker's assessment.

It would take a massive effort for England to win the trophy for the first time at a tournament in the Southern Hemisphere. Uncapped Warrington man Ben Currie could make a huge impact if given the chance at centre or second-row. Making the final is the minimum requirement for England but beating the Aussies looks beyond them.

New Zealand are the third favourites and look good things for a place in the last four. Shaun Johnson was voted the best player in the world in 2014. He has to be at his best for any chance of his side winning the big prize. The Kiwis have been hit by some high-profile absentees and they face a test to progress from the group that also includes Samoa, Tonga and Scotland.

Tonga are a good outside bet to go all the way but are not strong enough to win the World Cup for the first time. In Jason Taumalolo they have one of the most destructive forwards in the world. Their powerful, experienced squad could be dark horses for a place in the final.

However, Australia are too good to be denied and will be running around the Brisbane Stadium early in December with the trophy. Shocks in sport do not happen but even at 1/4 to win the Rugby League World Cup Australia look like one of the best bets of the year and the outcome returns a healthy 25% on your investment.



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
